109 DISTRICT 211 STUDENTS EARN CERTIFIED NURSING ASSISTANT CREDENTIALS

Students in District 211's Certified Nursing Assistant Program have recently earned credentials that can help start their careers.

A total of 109 District 211 students, including 65 from Conant, Hoffman, and Schaumburg High Schools and 44 from Palatine and Fremd High Schools, passed the state exam to become Certified Nursing Assistants.

"The health care pathway that we have in Township High School District 211 has grown over the last five years," said John Reyes, science teacher at Conant High School. "Since it's inception in 2012, we have produced more than 400 certified nursing assistants. The majority of our graduates from the first year of the program have gone on to become registered nurses, physical therapy students, and medical school students. The health care pathway is a great opportunity for anyone interested in the medical field."

The dual-credit, two-semester course allows students to learn nursing skills as well as provide hands-on clinical care with real patients. By the end of the course, students will have the qualifications to become Certified Nursing Assistants upon graduation, as well as earn six college credits.

The CNA labs at both Conant and Palatine High Schools have all the basic equipment students would use in a medical setting, as well as mannequins as patients. Students are taught skills to assist patients with daily living, including assisting with brushing teeth and going to the bathroom, how to take blood pressure, and how to transfer someone who is unable to move.

During second semester, students complete clinical hours. At the end of the semester, they have the opportunity to take the Nurse Aide Competency examination and be certified by the State of Illinois as Nurse Aides.

"The students are busy updating their resumes and will seek gainful employment soon after graduation," said Victoria Deguia, science teacher at Palatine High School. "We have had tremendous success in our program in terms of growth and certification."

National School Breakfast Week helps encourage and educate students about why they shouldn't skip what is considered the most important meal of the day. For many students in the country, including some in District 211, access to a proper breakfast isn't always possible.

That is why District 211 participated in National School Breakfast Week, which promotes the importance of breakfast for students.

This year, all five high schools served breakfast during lunch on Wednesday, March 9. Any students who purchased the breakfast meal for lunch received a raffle ticket for a chance to win five free breakfasts.

Fremd High School hosted its Breakfast with the Principal event on March 10. Principal Kurt Tenopir and FHS staff handed out 378 complimentary breakfast meals to students.

Schaumburg High School now offers a Grab and Go cart for breakfast in their main entrance, and on March 9 Siegie, the school's mascot, helped promote breakfast.

At District 211, both hot and cold breakfast entrees are served daily at all schools. Each school offers a minimum of seven breakfast options and approximately 1,100 breakfasts are served at school each morning. During first semester this school year, a total of 97,567 student breakfasts were served. The No.1 hot breakfast item across the district is chicken on a biscuit.

National School Breakfast Week was established in 1989 in coordination with the School Nutrition Association. It provides schools with the opportunity to highlight

and promote the importance of school breakfast. Research has shown that students who eat breakfast have improved memory, problem-solving skills, and creative abilities. School breakfast provides daily servings of fruit, whole grains, and low fat and fat free milk as well as meeting federal nutrition guidelines based on the Dietary Guidelines for Americans.

To stress the importance of eating a well-balanced breakfast, four District 211 schools participated in an event that offers a free meal to students.

Mary O'Connor, director of Food Service at District 211, said that on an average day roughly 100 to 400 breakfasts are served depending on the school. While each school does the event in its own way, generally the principal and administrators work on the serving lines to connect with their students.

"Breakfast is the most important meal of the day and provides our students with nutrients and energy," O'Connor said. "Research has shown that breakfast leads to increased concentration in the classroom, as well as performing better on tests."

National School Breakfast Week will take place March 7 through March 11 in 2016.
